

This Grand Jury, sworn in by the **Honorable Courtney L. Johnson** in the DeKalb Superior
Court on **May 2, 2017** respectfully submits the following presentments.

INDICTMENTS

This Grand Jury was presented with (370) cases during the May-June 2017 term. Of these cases (364) True Bills and (6) No Bills were returned. An additional (193) cases proceeded by Accusation.

REQUEST FOR PUBLICATION

Pursuant to the O.C.G.A. § 15-12-80, we the presently constituted Grand Jury recommend to the **Honorable Courtney L. Johnson** that these general presentments be published in whole in the County Legal Organ.



Recommendations:

- We recommend a review of the systems used to call people for jury duty. For
 example, one grand juror was called for regular jury service while still serving on the
 grand jury. Other grand jurors noted having been called for jury service multiple
 times in the past few years, while others had never been called at all.
- On the first date of the session when the jury was selected, the jurors noticed that people who loudly complained, even if they said "Ready," were not selected to serve on the jury, whereas people who simply said "Ready" without complaining were selected. The selection process should be randomized between all people who say "Ready" in order to be fairer; grand jury service is a burden for everyone regardless of whether they verbalize it on the first day.
- We recommend raising the pay to at least \$50 per day.
- The seating in the grand jury room is extremely uncomfortable, especially given that
 jurors sit for hours at a time. Additionally, jurors could use clipboards or tables to
 make notes on the calendars during each case.
- For the ease of court staff, we recommend the large computer screen be attached to the wall in the front of the room. It was cumbersome to move it around in such tight quarters.
- We were grateful for the small fridge but it is in dire need of being defrosted.
- Jurors asked for a vending machine in the small break room outside of the hall where there was also a bathroom. They do not cost the county anything, as companies supply them free and stock them.
- We recommend printing the calendars on both sides of the sheets to save paper since
 office supplies are a commodity. Some also recommended inquiring at stores such as
 Wal-Mart, Costco, and Sam's to give office supplies to the court staff after the school
 year has started. Many large companies do this with artificial Christmas trees and
 other products to nonprofit agencies.
- When first getting started, the grand jury members have never done this before and don't know what to ask or not ask. It would be helpful to give an example of a simple

case and what questions may be appropriate remembering we only need probable cause. Assistant District Attorney, Kelly McMichael did a great job explaining probable cause on the first day, but reviews might be useful. It might also be helpful to give further guidance on the specific types of evidence that do or do not constitute probable cause. For example, jurors were often unsure how to treat the evidence of victim testimony when there was no corroborating evidence of any kind. Additionally, there were times the grand jury felt unclear as to the overall purpose of the grand jury and how, specifically, the grand jury serves as a meaningful check in the justice system given that we see so little of the evidence in these cases.

- Jurors felt it might be easier to look up the criminal statutes in the handout we received if they were in alphabetical order.
- Daily reminders of the importance of jurors arriving on time, staying awake, and keeping their cell phones put away would be helpful. At orientation, it should also be stressed to the foreperson and assistant foreperson the importance of addressing any problems in these areas early in the session so that bad habits are not formed.
- On some cases, the evidence presented seemed insufficient. Jurors asked for photos or
 more information on several cases but none was available on some of the cases. It
 might behoove the state to have extra info on cases that are not clear-cut.
- Please remind ADAs that when there are multiple defendants on one case and
 numerous charges, it is important to be especially clear in reading the charges so that
 jurors are sure which charges apply to which people. It would also be helpful to
 specifically point out when the indictment does not match the charges listed on the
 calendar.
- One attorney asked the grand jury each time she entered, "does anyone know of or is related to John Doe or Mary Smith (defendant and victim)," so that we could leave the room immediately. This was very helpful. Two jurors knew of two separate cases but we were well into the facts before they realized they knew involved parties. We recommend that occur on each case.

Please stress to witnesses the importance of reading over their case files before giving
testimony. While many witnesses were very good, others clearly had not reviewed
files and were not prepared. Additionally, please emphasize to witnesses the
importance of arriving on time for their subpoenas. Finally, please remind witnesses
not to mention the race of defendants.

Jail Visit:

Our jail visit was educational and well organized. The grand jurors' eyes were opened with the amount of work and staff needed to make the jail a safe place for all. The grand jury recommends that jail personnel salaries be looked at to be commensurate with other jails in the Atlanta area. It is very costly to lose staff, especially well-trained, good staff to other agencies due to lower pay.

It was also noted by leadership at the jail that when the water goes out at the jail for whatever the reason (water main break, water department working on lines, etc.) it is a much bigger problem than expected. Toilets cannot be flushed, hands can't be washed, medical staff is greatly affected, there is no water for drinking or cooking, etc. We recommend that the county commissioners assess a way for a water tanker to hook into the water line at the building so that water can be back flowed into the building when water is shut off.

To conclude, we would like to emphasize that Deputy K. McNeil and Kelly McMichael were wonderful to work with, always professional and courteous.
