

COVID-19 Budget Update Budget Committee April 21, 2020



Month in Review

- Dunwoody's Original State of Emergency Declaration was on March 18.
- Mayor and Council were given a written analysis of the City's financial condition on March 21 with a public discussion of that information at the March 23 meeting.
- Based on the guidance from that meeting, staff has been reviewing the approved 2020 budget for recommended changes.
- Today's presentation will focus on SPLOST, Hotel/Motel, Capital, and fund balance usage.

Capital Projects

- Staff finds the first area where Mayor and Council recommendations are warranted is in capital projects.
- Dunwoody basically has three buckets of capital to address:



SPLOST

- SPLOST is the most restrictive capital funding the City has. It is limited to public safety, transportation, and limited general repairs.
- The original FY2020 Budget had \$6.8 million of new SPLOST funding. Since receipts are monthly and are based on all DeKalb sales, not just Dunwoody – any estimate of decreases may be adjusted upwards or downwards at a later date.

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Hotel/Motel

- Hotel/Motel's major issue is the drastic decrease in available funding for the current year. Instead of having almost \$800K to work with, new estimates will be slightly under \$200K.
- Some work may continue because there is approximately \$1.1M in previous years collections which can be used for those projects.
- Any discussion of using this funding to bond projects will have to be tabled until the industry recovers.

General Funded

- These projects' funding sources are very flexible and can be repurposed with Mayor and Council approval.
- The flip side is that there are very few of these projects and all are relatively smaller dollar amounts.

Annual Budgeting

- The City's General Fund budget is the largest single fund where most activities lie.
- In summary, a year's financials look like:
 - Starting Fund Balance
 - plus Revenues
 - less Expenditures
 - Ending Fund Balance
- City policy has the ending fund balance to be between four and six months of the budgeted expenditures.



- Pre-COVID, the City was reviewing its estimated starting fund balance for FY2020 in conjunction with the process of the closing of the books.
- Preliminary indications were going to necessitate bringing the amount above the six months level to Mayor and Council for one-time appropriations. Normally, capital needs would be addressed by this funding.

- Given the pandemic's uncertain influence on revenue, the above scenarios show a 30% reduction in total revenue and two alternative of spending at 95% and spending at 90%.
- Both scenarios allow the City to keep an adequate reserve level at the end of 2020.

- Staff has already identified \$849K (3.3%) of expenditures control which have already been implemented by controlling non-essential purchases.
 - \$200K Parks. Already had received lower bids, some program cancellations.
 - \$123K Public Works. Slight reduction to all R&M efforts with minimal service level reductions.
 - \$100K Elimination of Budgeted Contingency.
 - \$91K Police. Primarily travel, training, etc.
 - \$56K Elimination of City Hall Sinking Fund Payment.
 - \$42K Elimination of print edition of Dunwoody Digest.
 - \$278K in all Other Departments.

- This process will continue throughout the state of emergency and increase as better revenue figures come in.
- It should also be noted, that there will be increases to some extent due to the pandemic.
 e.g. Safety efforts and information technology improvements.
